[Instructions to Authors]

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GENERAL. The *Medical Mycology Journal* is published by and is the official organ of the Japanese Society for Medical Mycology. The Journal publishes original articles, reviews, short reports and opinions on topics related to medical and veterinary mycology. Special lectures, award lectures, symposiums, workshops, panels, etc. at annual meetings are regarded as reviews.

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The Journal welcomes submissions from everyone, irrespective of membership in the Society. Submitted manuscripts must represent reports that have been neither previously published nor accepted for publication in another journal.

MANUSCRIPTS. All manuscripts should be submitted through the online submission review system of this Society (https://www. editorialmanager.com/mmj/). Uploaded files should be confined to Word (.docx) format for text and either Power Point (.pptx) or Excel (.xlsx) for figures and tables. The text plus general information (/review) should be, in principle, six (6) pages (about 4,000 words) or fewer in its printed version. Short reports should be three (3) pages (about 2,000 words) or fewer in the printed version. Opinions should be one (1) page (about 700 words) or fewer in the printed version. However, regarding figures and tables, one printed page is expected to be equivalent to 700 words.

Manuscripts submitted for publication are expected typewritten and double-spaced. Authors whose native language is not English must have their manuscript checked by a professional translator, preferably a native English speaker. The text of each manuscript should be divided into the following sections: Abstract, Introduction, Materials/Patients/Subjects and Methods, Results, Discussion, Acknowledgments, and References. For case reports, "Introduction" should be followed by "Case" that starts with a medical history. All pages must be numbered consecutively in the following order, with each of the following beginning on a separate page: abstract, text, acknowledgments, references, tables, and figure legends. All abbreviations must be defined the first time they are used. Page numbers and line numbers should be added.

The "Images in Mycoses" section features images containing noteworthy findings and observations while the "Photo Quiz" section presents explanations of images in quiz format. "Images in Mycoses" and "Photo Quiz" sections shall feature mainly one or more photos and shall not be more than two printed pages.

Images in Mycoses: Photos shall be included in the first page, which shall also include the title, authors' names, and affiliations. The second page shall include the text briefly summarizing the description of the image (e. g. case history, progress, treatment, etc.), discussion, and references, in not be more than 350 words.

Photo Quiz: Question and corresponding photo (s) shall be in-

cluded in the first page, which shall also include title, authors' names, and affiliations. The second page shall include the brief summary of the answer to the problem and explanation, additional photos, and references, in not be more than 350 words.

ABSTRACT. The abstract for an original article should be of 250 words or fewer; that for a short report should be of 100 words or fewer.

These should clearly indicate the scope and main conclusions of the paper.

KEY WORD. The keyword should be within 5 words.

REFERENCES. All references must be cited in numerical order as they appear in the text. Unpublished observations and personal communications may be included in the text only. If there are seven or more authors, only six should be listed, and et al. should be added. Each reference should include the following:

- a. Papers published in periodicals: author (s) (surname followed by initials), full title of paper, journal abbreviation, volume (in Arabic numerals), first and last page numbers, and year of publication, *e. g.*: Larkin PMK, Lawson KL, Contreras DA, Le CQ, Trejo M, Realegeno S, et al: Ampliconbased next-generation sequencing for detection of fungi in formalin-fixed, paraffin-embedded tissues: correlation with histopathology and clinical applications. J Mol Diagnostics 22: 1287–93, 2020. Journal titles should be abbreviated according to the system adopted in Chemical Abstract.
- b. Books: author (s), full title of chapter, editor (s), title of book, edition (if other than first), volume, first and last page numbers, publisher, name of the city of publisher, and year of publication, *e. g.*: Witherden EA, Moyes DL: Mycobiome and gut inflammation: implications in gut disease. *In* Immunity and Inflammation in Health and Disease (Chatterjee S, Jungraithmayr W, Bagchi D, eds), pp.271–80, Academic Press, Cambridge, 2018.
- c. Abstracts of meeting: author (s), full title of abstracts, title of abstracts, editor (s), first and last page numbers, publisher, name of the meeting, location, and year of publication, *e. g.*: Izumikawa K, Miyazaki Y, Kohno S: Chronic pulmonary aspergillosis. *In* Medical Mycology in the 21th Century: Scientific Base and Anticipated Challenges, Program and Abstract Book (Ogawa H, Yamaguchi H, Nozawa Y, Watanabe S, Tsuboi R, Hiruma M, et al, eds), p.211, The 17th Congress of The International Society for Human and Animal Mycology, Tokyo, Japan, 2009.

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NOMENCLATURE. Proposals for new fungal taxa should comply with the International Code of Nomenclature for algae, fungi, and plants. For proposed taxonomic taxa, it is necessary to deposit the type culture in a specified institution, the unique nucleotide and amino acid sequences of the strains in a suitable database, and the scientific names in a recognized identifier such as MycoBank.

Fungal species names should be written in italics and must be spelled out fully the first time they are mentioned in the abstract, main text, and figures/tables. However, in subsequent mentions, the genus name can be abbreviated to the initial letter. For example, for *Candida albicans*, it should be written in full as "*Candida albicans*" the first time it is cited and as "*C. albicans*" in the rest of the text. In the description of varieties, the variety name alone cannot be used as abbreviation. For instance, "*Histoplasma capsulatum* var. *duboisii*" should not be abbreviated to just "var. *duboisii*". Abbreviated forms of the genus and species names should not be used (for example, "*C. albicans*" should not be abbreviated to "*Ca*").
